The Mozart Legacy



Salzburg was founded around 696 when missionary Saint Rupert arrived in the area. The small town quickly became an independent ecclesiastical state, much like the Vatican, and was called the "Rome of the North." The face of modern Salzburg, dominated by the Baroque grandeur of the Old Town, was crafted during the 17th and 18th centuries. In 1756, the city became the birthplace of Austria's most famous son, W.A. Mozart, who gave Salzburg worldwide fame. The city rests along the banks of the Salzach River, near the northern edge of the Alps. The mountains to the south of Salzburg sharply contrast with the sprawling plains to the north. The Alpine peak Untersberg, standing at 6,470 feet, is just a few miles from the city center. Salzburg is about 93 miles east of Munich, Germany, and 186 miles west of Vienna. The name "Salzburg" was first noted at the end of the 8th century, combining "Salz" (German for "salt") and "burg" (meaning "settlement" in German).

A Walk Through the City



No matter how many attractions Salzburg offers, the first destination for most visitors is the house where the incomparable musical genius Mozart was born in 1756. Mozart's birthplace is one of Austria's most visited museums and an iconic symbol of the city. Not far from there awaits the Old Town, a UNESCO World Heritage site filled with splendor. Salzburg's Old Town is one of the best-preserved city centers north of the Alps. Known for its Baroque architecture, Alpine atmosphere, and picturesque location along the Salzach River, Salzburg's historical heart charms and delights countless visitors.



Standing proudly in Domplatz is the Salzburg Cathedral, dedicated to Saint Rupert and Saint Vergilius. Its Baroque marble facade and grand dome are sure to catch your eye, but the interior is particularly striking. On the southern side of the cathedral, you'll notice a spacious square that was once the site of the Cathedral Abbey, where high-ranking clergy resided. Today, the square features a notable attraction: the artwork "Sphaera," a large golden sphere with a figure standing on top.

Overlooking the city are the walls of the Hohensalzburg Fortress, one of the largest medieval castles in Europe, dating back to the 11th century. This impressive structure is a remarkable display of the desire of Salzburg's prince-archbishops to assert their political power and authority. A walk through this extraordinary site is simply unforgettable.

Gardens, Palaces, and Music



The city's character is brought to life by its intertwined gardens, most notably the Mirabell Garden, a stunning public park on the northern side of the Salzach River. It's one of the most beautiful gardens you'll see, created in the 17th century by Prince-Archbishop Wolf Dietrich von Raitenau as a private retreat. Mirabell Palace features a range of decorative elements, including fountains, statues, and flower beds. The garden's most famous feature is the grand fountain with a statue of Pegasus, the winged horse from Greek mythology. There's also the beautiful Hellbrunn Palace, a summer residence for the prince-archbishops of Salzburg, built in the early 17th century and renowned for its gardens, artful fountains, and walkways. One of the palace's most famous attractions is the "Trick Fountains," a series of hidden water features designed to surprise and delight visitors.

Adventures Beyond the City



Just under two hours from Salzburg, you can raise your spirits to the sky. Some say that skiing was invented in Kitzbühel. It's always in season, and skiing there is a dream!
